## **Our Agencies**

#### SA Health

SA Health recognises that a safe food supply is a major contributing factor to the health of South Australians. The Food Safety and Regulation Branch work together with other state and national government agencies, and local councils to ensure:

- that food for sale in SA is safe and suitable; and
- consistency and integration of the bi-national food regulation system with New Zealand

The Food Safety and Regulation Branch undertakes work to protect the community from preventable health risks associated with the consumption of unsafe food by administering the Food Act 2001 and associated regulations and the Australia New Zealand Food Standards Code.

The Food Safety and Regulation Branch:

- monitors and enforces compliance with the Food Act 2001 (SA), the Food Regulations 2017 (SA) and the Australia New Zealand Food Standards Code
- engages in food surveys and sampling to inform national and state policies.
- supports, advises and works with local government on consistency and workforce development

- develops and implements national and state food policy and law
- educates regulators, food businesses, consumers, students and other interested parties about food safety, labelling and food standards
- investigates food poisoning and other food safety incidents and taking corrective action (such as food recalls) to protect the safety of the food supply
- coordinates the South Australian government's position regarding the regulation of genetically modified organisms and genetically modified food
- approves and verifies food safety auditors
- conducts food safety audits of public hospitals, not for profit delivered meals organisations and other government agencies

#### **Department of Primary Industries and Regions**

The Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) is a key economic development agency in the government of South Australia. We aim to advance the prosperity and sustainability of South Australia's primary industries and the liveability of regional communities.

We make a difference so South Australia thrives by advancing the prosperity of our primary industries, their communities and regions.

The Food Safety program improves food safety in primary industries and aims to:

- lower cases of food borne illness
- create confidence in food industries
- make sure food production and processing businesses comply with standards and regulations
- apply risk mitigation strategies
- link food production industry to government departments.

#### Dairysafe

Dairysafe is an independent statutory authority established under regulation 7 of the *Primary Produce (Food Safety Schemes) (Dairy) Regulations 2017.* 

Dairysafe is the accreditation body for the dairy industry food safety scheme in South Australia and is funded by industry accreditation fees.

Dairysafe's role is to safeguard public health by maintaining a robust regulatory framework that also underpins market access and growth of South Australia's dairy industry. This ensures that Australian food safety standards (the Food Standards Code) are complied with at each point in the supply chain and producers and processors have the capacity and capability to produce safe dairy products. Dairysafe accredits dairy farmers, raw milk transporters and dairy processors and audits accredited businesses for compliance with the Food Standards Code. Dairysafe also assists businesses along the supply chain to resolve issues that can impact the integrity of dairy products. The objective is to apply an appropriate accreditation and compliance verification framework whilst not stifling innovation.

#### The benefits

Opportunities to participate in local and national projects can provide broad networks and experiences that will deliver knowledge and personal growth.


The outcomes you produce can contribute to the broader government focus on positive public health outcomes, industry development and growth.
